Waste Pickers in Indonesia



In Indonesia,

waste pickers play a pivotal part in the collection process¹

83% of the plastic waste in Java is collected by them

Yet...

Waste pickers face challenges³:

- Low social recognition of waste pickers work
- Unsafe working environment
- Gender wage gap: on average, women earn ~ 50% less income⁴



Leading to...



Difficult livelihoods

- Low income: waste pickers' income are equivalent or below the minimum wage in Jakarta (2013)
- Unstable income: variation of waste value
- Low financial literacy and difficulty to access its services



Marginalized communities

- Structural difficulties to access basic health and educations services
- Waste pickers are often viewed as unclean and less educated by their communities



Health problems

- Daily exposure to hazardous waste material
- Waste collected without protection against sun, sharp objects and harmful bacteria

Environmental Challenges

A resilient and structured waste-circuit is key to divert waste from landfill

- There is a lack of structured recycling systems⁵
- Low awareness among households regarding plastic pollution and the need to recycle
- Low awareness on proper waste disposal, leading to high littering behaviour

How it Works7

The Indonesian waste management system is composed of both **informal** and **formal** actors



Informal: Collection Centers

Collection Centers purchase the recyclable waste picked up by waste pickers

Formal: Sorting Centers

Sorting Centers collect wastes from households picked up by Sorting Centers employees



Fostering both informal and formal actors involvement is critical in building an inclusive and efficient waste management system⁷

A specific support is then offered to workers




The empowerment of waste-circuit stakeholders ensures the **efficiency** and **productivity** of Collection & Sorting Centers allowing to:
